A Word from the Chair

What a fantastically busy summer term the Group has had! So much going on in the various weekly meetings and augmented by District Mega Camp, and other events/activities enjoyed by all of the Sections.



Our role on the Executive is threefold. (1) We are (in law) the Charity Trustees of the charity that is 1st Purley and Pangbourne Scout Group. (2) We need to make sure that the Group's finances and resources are in good order to fully support the work of each of our Beaver, Cub, Scout and Explorer Sections. (3) We need to simplify 'administration' so that the Leaders and other adults working with each Section spend their time delivering programme and not collecting money and keeping lists of who is attending which event.

For (1), we have a well-run charity, but we would like you to come and verify that for yourselves at the Group's Annual General Meeting which will be on Friday 16th September. More details later, but please keep the evening free in your diary.

For (2), we believe that we offer really good value for money in each of our Sections and hope that you will agree with that, even though we have recently had to increase our membership fees following this year's budgeting.

For (3), we are increasingly exploiting Online Scout Manager (OSM). There have been a small number of hiccoughs with that as we have learnt how best to use the system, but in the main it is working well. Some parents have still chosen to pay with cheque or cash, which is absolutely fine, but in 2016 there have been almost 500 payments through OSM that Leaders would otherwise have had to collate and pass to Gail Jugg (our Treasurer) for banking, so that is a significant time saving. If you do think there has been an OSM problem, please let me know quickly (chair@1stpandp.org.uk) and we will sort the issue – we want to save on admin, not cause any consternation!

Finally, we hope that you have a great summer and come back fully refreshed for the autumn term in September.
